Online Safety Tips for Teens

We're sure you've already been told, probably many times, about staying safe online. The following tips are a refresher to remind you what you should and shouldn't do when you're online:



- **Personal Info** – Keep your personal information personal. Don't share it without your parents' permission. This includes your last name, home address, school name or phone number.
- **Screen Names** – When creating a screen name, keep personal information like your last name or date of birth out of it.
- **Passwords** – Don't share your password with anyone but your parents. Make sure each one is unique. And if you're using a public computer, like at the library, make sure you log out of your accounts before you walk away.
- **Photos** – Don't post photos or videos online without asking your parents first.
- **Online Friends** – Sure, that new online friend may seem nice. But sometimes people aren't who they say they are. Don't agree to meet an online friend unless you have your parents' permission.
- **Online Shopping** – Don't buy anything online without talking to your parents first. You may be tempted to click on those online ads offering free things or telling you that you've won a prize – don't do it!
- **Downloading** – It's hard to pass up a "free" app, but always talk to your parents before you open an email attachment or download anything. Sometimes viruses come with those free offers.
